Low-Stress Handling Workshop



On September 13th we had the privilege of hosting Kobe Fehr from RCK Cowdogs in the Peace Region for a Low-Stress Handling Workshop. Given the limited space available, we ensured that all participants could maximize their experience while minimizing stress on the cattle provided for the event. Many participants were given the opportunity to bring their own horse or dog, or work the cattle on-foot under the guidance of Kobe, and we had a full house eager to learn at the Teepee Creek Arena.





Kobe and his family, originally from British Columbia's Peace region, now reside in Coronation, Alberta, where he works as a fulltime cowboy. He utilizes low-stress handling methods on a large feedlot. Before assuming his current role, Kobe gained valuable experience working on a large ranch in the Okanagan Valley of British Columbia, which allowed him to observe cattle management across diverse terrains and settings.

In his daily operations, Kobe relies on his 17-year-old ranch horse and two Border Collie dogs, Lorri and Rip, to effectively maneuver cattle. He believes that animals can read each other better than humans, and by leveraging this understanding, he fosters a calmer and happier environment for the cattle. This approach not only enhances their safety but also contributes to consistent average daily gains (ADG).

We began the day with a classroom-style presentation highlighting the advantages of Low-Stress Handling techniques. Following this, Kobe conducted a live demonstration using his horse and dogs, effectively moving the cattle around the arena and into a holding pen. He expertly sorted and separated specific cows while ensuring they remained calm and content.

After the demonstration, we enjoyed a delightful catered lunch from Lefty's Catering. The afternoon was dedicated to one-on-one sessions with participants, while the rest of the group observed the interactions.





Comparing Common Oat & Barley Against Soft White Wheat for Silage

Summarized by Alaina Archibald from the 2017 Research Trial

In 2017, the Peace Country Beef & Forage Association (PCBFA) evaluated various barley and oat varieties commonly grown in the Peace Region for greenfeed and silage, comparing them against four soft white wheat varieties and bunker triticale.

Winter feed expenses typically represent the largest portion of costs in cow/calf operations. In the Peace region, oats and barley are the predominant cool-season cereals utilized in beef cattle production. These crops are grown for greenfeed, swath grazing, pastures, and silage, and have recently been incorporated into cocktail mixtures. In central and southern Alberta, the adoption of soft white wheat for silage has notably increased due to its superior stress tolerance and better standing capability in comparison to barley. However, a limitation is that soft white wheat is harvested later than traditional barley silage and can be more challenging to source. Nevertheless, producers in these regions have reported yields that are 25-50% higher when using soft white wheat for silage.



The common varieties of oats and barley cultivated in the Peace region were assessed alongside newly registered varieties, demonstrating comparable forage yield and quality. Notably, newly registered oats and barley exhibited slightly superior forage quality indicators. For example, CDC Haymaker oats showed higher crude protein (CP) levels compared to other oat varieties. Additionally, Bunker triticale outperformed both oats and barley in terms of forage dry matter (DM) yield.

Overall, the soft white wheat varieties evaluated yielded between 660 and 3,410 lbs DM per acre more than the oat varieties. Furthermore, the difference in forage DM yield between soft white wheat varieties and barley ranged from 885 to 3,301 lbs DM per acre, favouring the soft white wheat. The forage DM yield of Bunker triticale, expressed as a percentage of oats and barley, was between 112% and 140%, and 115% to 138%, respectively.

- Prevent or identify severe issues caused by toxicity from mycotoxins, nitrates, sulphates, or other minerals and nutrients.
- Mitigate production challenges, such as low conception rates or inadequate weight gain, stemming from mineral or nutrient deficiencies or excesses.
- Optimize feeding practices and explore options for incorporating diverse ingredients, such as fruit and vegetable waste.

PCBFA is pleased to collaborate with several municipalities to facilitate the process by offering convenient drop-off and shipment centers. We understand that producers lead busy lives, and our aim is to alleviate your stress and involvement, allowing you to dedicate more time to your farm or family.


